T.G. Pullins, a bread shop, yet more than a bread shop. The smell of bread and pastries wafts down the road enticing you into the warmth and delights of their shop to savour the baking now!

At Bristol Hospitality Network (BHN) we had a need, to give our asylum seekers, when they came into the Welcome Centre, a taste of something special. Perhaps not having had a great deal to eat before coming.

Having known T.G. Pullins for many years and been aware of their generosity, I asked if they might be able to supply bread for us as we no longer had anyone able to provide it. In less than 10 minutes the answer came "Yes we'd be very happy to" (give you bread to meet your needs). Now I collect it each Monday morning. Pullins bread is very delicious as many of our refugees now know and they are very appreciative of the kindness of this particular bakers. Thank you Pullins – Star Bakers.

Previously we also used to get our bread from Joe Bakery and Herberts

Discover our partners: Welcome Voices

Welcome Voices is a cultural integration choir combining mindful singing, breathing and vocal harmony. Every Monday they have been running workshops at the Welcome Centre singing with our members.

The choir was founded in 2018 by Pete Warnock and Kerry Ann Smith both passionate about music and its use for well-being, and is funded by The National Community Lottery for 12 weeks, until 17th June 2019.

The aim of the program is to help refugees, asylum seekers and everybody who has experienced displacement to feel integrated in community.

To do that, 12 weekly 90 minute sessions are organised for free to refugees and asylum seekers and - waged individuals from from the wider general public are welcome to attend on a 'pay if you can' basis (suggested £3 minimum donation) or more if you want and can!

Everybody from the Bristol area is welcome to participate in one or more sessions. Participating in this program is beneficial for everyone, it reduces they can join in.

BHN members are enjoying learning with Kris how to use the machine and pairing with Grace or Susan to become a sewing whizz.

This group is open to everyone, members and volunteers, men and women, everyone is very welcome to have a go with the sewing machine.

There is no age limit anyone for anyone wanting to learn to sew young and old are equally good.

Moreover, if you make a donation to BHN, come to the Welcome Centre and get your hand-made tote-bag!
